MOT Proposed changes;

Much has been written about of late about proposed changes to the mot for classic vehicles. The ever meddling stream of legislation from Brussels wanted a standard mot for across the EEC. One of the proposals was the "Vehicles must remain unaltered with regard to engine, steering, suspension and braking systems." Part of the proposal was that modified cars could no longer be considered as classic cars if they were modified. This could have been guite serious if left unchallenged. The regulation even went as far as a car fitted with drum brakes couldn't have disc brakes fitted from a later car. Even tyres were discussed, that means we would all have to go back onto Dunlop SP68's! Fortunately it was challenged and changed; classic vehicles have now been discounted from the legislation due to a significant change in the wording. It was changed from a "Regulation," this means it is legal and has to be followed to a "Directive" which means Governments can apply their own laws.

Cars previously unknown to us are still appearing at quite frequent intervals, prices for nice examples are currently very strong indeed. Pictured below is one example which has recently appeared on ebay for £11990. I must say it is a stunning example with nice history and low mileage.
